## 1. A Turning Point for the

$\qquad$ . (vv. 16-18)

Beginning with chapter 5, John traces a growing $\qquad$ of Jesus as Messiah and the growth of a determined hostility toward Jesus as a person.

- The Sickness:

Jesus knew the man was helpless and, more importantly, the

## Arise:

## Walk:

A fear of the unknown is often the reason people would rather have a $\qquad$ , or not be healed in the first place.

## Sin No More:

## 3. A Turning Point for the

From here on out, the Jewish leaders were in constant
